Looking after your spiritual health

The Church of England have now produced a series of 13 pdf reflections, free to download from cofe.io./mentalhealth and some of their online services will address this theme in weeks to come.

I was never encouraged to memorise poems or prayers when I was at young, but it's a skill I have always admired in others. For those like me, we may find it helpful to memorise a verse or passage of scripture that we can use when we feel anxious, such as:-

A wild flower meadow from Judith Hughes (in response to Ann Chapman's report last week)

I share your interest Ann in creating a wild flower meadow as we have been doing this now for some years. Unfortunately for us the grass that was there was the rather tough variety which is hard for the plants to compete with. The decision is whether to have a perennial meadow or an annual. If you go for the latter it has to be cleared off and resown every year.

We have found that the generous use of yellow rattle (purchased in bulk from Emorsgate seeds, they have a farm just outside Bath though are based in Norfolk) helps to keep the grass down.

We have plenty of ox-eye daisies and the field geranium as well as cowslips in the spring and many more of the common plants including buttercups. The council have decided to re-wild existing grass areas (apart from the verges) and we have one such area in Priory.

It will be interesting to see what comes up. I have already counted at least six different types of grasses. Presumably it was once a meadow before being part of the grounds of Priory House.






