Remember the Rainbow: a contribution from Rev Paul Batson

What have we learnt so far from the Pandemic? That we are One World? That self-interest means everyone's interest? That no one's safe unless we are all safe? Last Sunday's gospel reading is a stark reminder of how Jesus saw the way to live, 'If any want to become followers of mine, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me.' (Mark 8:34 NRSV)

The Pandemic remains a mortal threat to the world's population. But our preoccupation with saving human life – as essential as that is – is in danger of blinding us to an even greater catastrophe, namely – the destruction of the planet and of all life on earth. The threat posed by the coronavirus and its variants and that posed by global warming are mind-blowing, and both require a collaborative worldwide response.

As the Psalmist declared, 'The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it' (Psalm 24). Humankind has been given the responsibility for looking after God's world as good stewards for the good of all, not for short- term selfish ends (Genesis 1:28). What about the rainbow? It's a reminder of our partnership with God to care for the earth and all living creatures on the earth (Genesis 9:8-17). This has enormous consequences for the way we choose to live as individuals, families, communities, nations and as one world. Jesus's teaching, time and again, stressed the essential attitude that, 'what we do or fail to do for a fellow human being we do or fail to do for God' (Matthew 25:1-31). When asked 'who is my neighbour?' Jesus tells a story that makes it clear that all people in need are my neighbour, even the people I hate.

In the current circumstances it can be all too easy to be overwhelmed and think that there is nothing we can do. But we need to remember that with God nothing is impossible. Isn't this the underlying message of the Feeding of the Five Thousand? (Matthew 14:15f; Luke 9:10-17). In this event the offering of a little – five loaves and two fishes – goes a very long way. Time and again the action of one person can have a remarkable impact on others for good. Captain Sir Tom Moore was an obvious example and so is Greta Thunberg. Whilst their contributions are well known it is up to all of us to do what we can so that together we can overcome these daunting problems. St Teresa of Calcutta put it rather well, 'We can do no great things – only small things with great love.'

If we are to survive we need to wake up to the reality of our interdependence upon one another. There are some people who are unable to receive the vaccine for good reasons, usually medical, but those who refuse for no good reason are putting themselves and other people, including children, at greater risk. As the Queen said last week, very gently, 'If one doesn't want the vaccine for oneself please receive it for the welfare of others'.

Saving the planet is an even bigger challenge than overcoming the coronavirus, but here again every little thing we do can begin to make a difference. Planting a thousand trees in Winsley is a positive initiative; establishing conservation areas in our churchyards and in our gardens where possible; being passionate about recycling and reducing our carbon footprint; supporting some of the remarkable charities that are doing an incredible job to save the planet. For inspiration and a better understanding of global warming, I strongly recommend you watch David Attenborough's five-part series 'A Perfect Planet' – series 1, shown earlier this year, which is available on BBC iPlayer. Episode 5 'Humans' is particularly important and encouraging.

God created us to live as one world, interconnected and interdependent. We need to work collaboratively to solve our problems and to live justly and in peace. That seems to me to be the underlying challenge facing us today. What a task! But if we remember the rainbow, then we are not alone and with faith in God and a willingness to work generously, sacrificially and humbly across the boundaries of faith, nationality, gender, status or party politics, then surely there is hope? *Rev Paul Batson*

Church Services

At a Zoom meeting on Friday afternoon, the church leaders and I agreed that we would aim for two church services up until Easter, as long as restrictions continue to allow. The first will be on Sunday 21st March with a joint service with Monkton Farleigh at South Wraxall and a second joint service at Christ Church for Winsley and Christ Church. This pattern will be repeated for Easter Sunday.

The reason for this is that the building at Christ Church will accommodate a greater number of people than Winsley and is easier to ventilate as it has two entrances. The same applies to the arrangement at South Wraxall as it is larger, can accommodate the numbers from the two congregations and it too has two entrances, hence better ventilation.

You will be contacted nearer the time to book in to both services. Arrangements have been made with the Mount Pleasant Centre to allow for parking on those two Sundays but **users must register their car** numbers at the centre on the day or risk a fine.

Not everyone will feel comfortable returning to a church service, so be assured, online services will continue as before. *Rev Ann Keating*.

Christ Church Community Project New greeting card designs


I have added another four designs to the range of greeting cards I am selling for the Christ Church Community project to add a toilet and kitchen area.
