Dear friends

How is our faith this morning? How are we coping with the pressures of daily living, the social distancing, the self-isolation? Some of us will be hating it – desperately missing our families and friends, that physical contact. Others will be loving it. An opportunity for quality quiet times, a chance to paint, to draw, to garden, to learn new skills which we have never had time for.

I wonder if we look back, have we ever been in any of the following situations? Losing one's job or redundancy, empty nest syndrome when children leave home, marriage break-up and divorce or worrying about elderly parents. They might have been really tough times but somehow as Christians we would have known that at some level, God would have been present.

We also know about Jesus and God being the potter and us the clay being moulded. We know about the oyster and how the beautiful pearl is made, because the oyster decides to get rid of the sand that is in its shell, and it starts to make fluid and it has this irritation, and suddenly this beautiful pearl is made. We know these stories, we know God's presence in our minds, but we need to know it in our hearts too.

It might be that we are afraid of the future but let's remember today. We only have today. We have to learn to live one step at a time and then rest in God. Fear can be very debilitating and can poison our inner peace. The coming of the Holy Spirit released the early followers of Christ from their fear and that must surely be our prayer for us as followers today. 'Come Holy Spirit.'

So, what is the anti-toxicant for fear? There are five:

Firstly pray – loads and loads of prayer. Whenever you feel anxious or fearful, turn your eyes to Jesus and pray. If you feel you can't pray, tell someone and they will pray for you.

Secondly **turn to your Bible** and find those passages that remind you that we can know God's peace in all circumstances, that perfect love casts out fear

Play music that moves you, makes you want to dance and worship. Find those CDs you have tucked away of hymns, worship songs, Christmas Carols and sing along to them. Music is a powerful way of lifting one's spirits and worshipping.

A **fear shared** is a fear halved. Pick up the phone and ring someone. Remember you are not alone, and others will be feeling like you.

Finally **hold onto hope** and never let it go. Remember you are a child of God, known and called by name, cherished and loved. You are being prayed for; others are holding you in their thoughts and prayers.

Stay safe and stay well.

Malcolm Guite Easter 2020



Like all of us, I have been drawn deeply into this strange Easter when so much of the outwardly familiar has been taken away, and yet the inwardly familiar, the great Easter story of Death and Resurrection, has suddenly been renewed and become more agonisingly close, more vividly relevant to our lives than ever. But, like so many, I am deeply distressed at not being able to gather in church this morning, and to receive communion in community, to meet Christ 'risen in bread, and revelling in wine', as I put it in a sonnet long ago. But this Easter he calls me to discern him in new ways and in different places. He is risen indeed, and if I cannot go to church then where am I to find him? That is the question my new poem seeks to address, and if it is a question you ask yourselves too, then I hope you will find this poem helpful


And where is Jesus, this strange Easter day?
Not lost in our locked churches, anymore
Than he was sealed in that dark sepulchre.
The locks are loosed; the stone is rolled away,
And he is up and risen, long before, ...
Alive, at large, and making his strong way

No need to seek him in his empty grave.

He might have been a wafer in the hands
Of priests this day, or music from the lips

The first line of the Lord's Prayer helps us find our place in the universe despite the chaos and suffering around us and the pain within us. We remember that we are not here by accident or chance, but we are deeply loved children of our maker. You are not alone but connected as God's child with all of humanity. You are part of the church of Jesus Christ. Our Father is indeed in heaven, but this prayer is given to us by his Son, Jesus, who lived and suffered with us and who rose again from death.

Read



Acts 1.1-3

¹ In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning ² until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. ³ After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them over the course of forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God.

Reflect



In the early Church, most candidates were baptized at Easter. In baptism, we die with Christ and rise again to the joy of new and eternal life with God.

The Church celebrates Easter for 50 days: 40 days between Easter and Ascension and then 10 more days looking forward to Pentecost and the gift of the Spirit.

In this Easter season, the Church gives to the newly baptized all that we need to grow in faith and to live a good and fruitful life. One of the most important of those gifts is the Lord's Prayer.

Many today learn the kingdom prayer by heart as children, but then never understand its meaning as adults. In the early Church, new Christians would be taught the prayer for the first time just after baptism as one of the great mysteries of the faith. Come to the Lord's Prayer in this season with fresh eyes and in the joy of Easter.

Pause



Remember the earliest time you heard and used this prayer. What does it mean to you?

Pray



Pray the Lord's Prayer slowly and carefully today and each day in the Easter season.

Family challenge



When Jesus' disciples asked him how to pray, he gave them the prayer that begins "Our Father in heaven". We call it The Lord's Prayer. Over the next few days, try to learn this prayer by heart. If you already know it, look online. Can you learn the Lord's Prayer in another language or in British Sign Language?

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
