Microscopes for Malaria An example of International Outreach in our Benefice

I have a small scheme sending out microscopes to Africa for the diagnosis of malaria, since microscopes are still best way to diagnose the disease. I have been getting them from university departments and hospitals and they are second hand but generally in very good condition. Often, they are surplus to requirement, when new ones are purchased, and sitting in store rooms and cupboards. So far the University of Bath, Department of Biology, and University of Bristol Dental School and Southmead Hospital have kindly donated them.

The clinics and hospitals in Africa have been found via the Anglican Communion, which is a network of churches throughout the world. Its easy to find an email of an African bishop or administrator on the Anglican communion website and is a great way to find out where there is a need since they know all the local hospitals and clinics. Also I've used Caritas,



the catholic relief and development agency, who are also throughout Africa. So far I've heard back from Ghana, Zambia, Congo, Malawi, Burundi, and Kenya all wanting microscopes!

The next problem is how to send them as they are quite heavy. It's expensive to use a courier and the whole scheme is done for free (or minimum budget) and I don't like asking for money! Again Christian organisations are very helpful. I've established a good collaboration with USPG (a former missionary organisation) and the Church Missionary Society who are often going off to different parts of the world. They've been happy to take the microscopes out in their luggage.



So far I've sent out a total of eight microscopes. Here are some examples (see photos):
